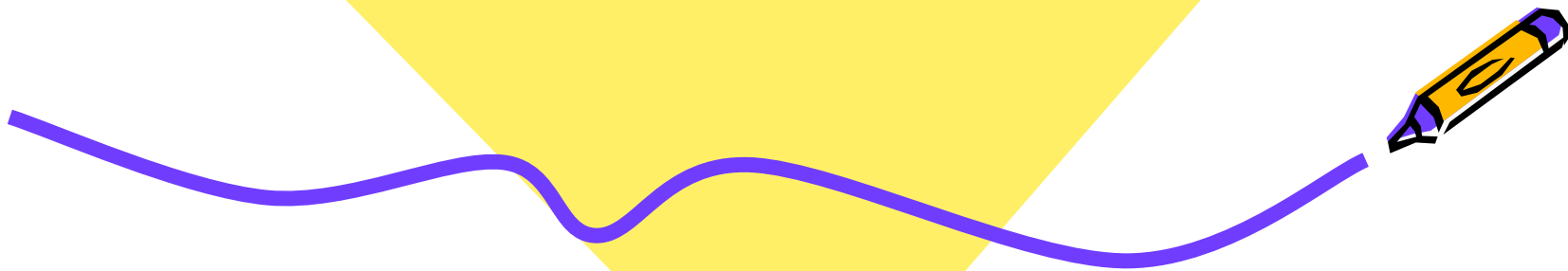

Purposes of the Meeting

- To inform parents of the school's participation in Title 1
- To explain programs and activities which promote parental involvement
- To identify barriers to greater participation by parents



What You Should Know About Title 1



- Provides money to assist students in reaching state content standards.
- Requires that parents are consulted with and given information about the school's programs at an annual meeting.
- Requires schools to have a School Site Council consisting of parents and school staff (and students at high school level) that revises approves, and evaluates the school's Single Plan for Student Achievement.
- Requires development of a Parent and Family Engagement Policy
- Requires a Home-School Compact stating the shared responsibility of staff, parents and students in raising student achievement.



Our Title 1 Program

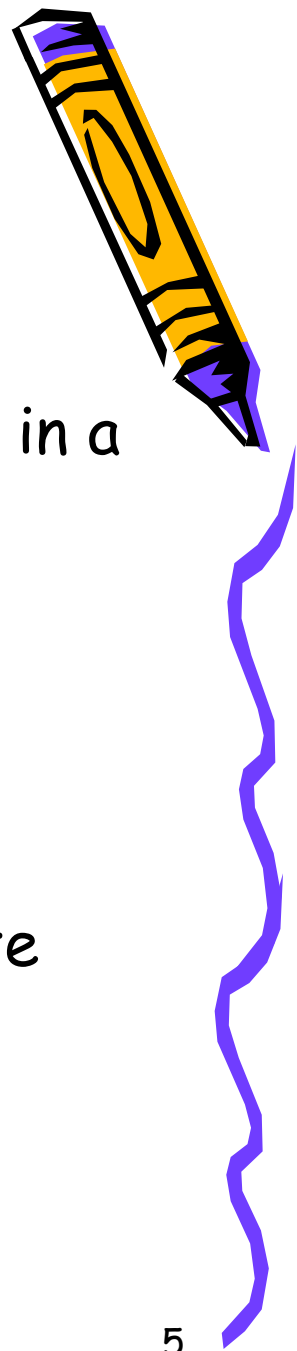


- Our funding services all students

Information on Your Child's Progress



- District sends scores from state assessments in a letter to your home in September
- School provides additional feedback:
 - Progress reports/report cards
 - Parent-Teacher conferences
 - Common interim assessments to identify students who are meeting/not meeting state standards
 - On Schoolloop



How You Can Get Involved



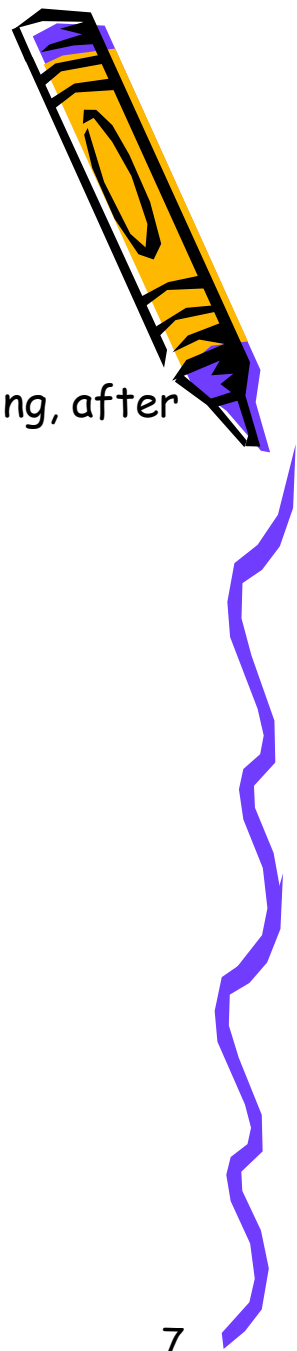
- School Site Council (SSC) - Annually reviews assessment data and advises school on improvement plans aligned with performance goals including expenditures of funds to support the plan
- English Language Advisory Committee (ELAC) - Advises School Site Council on programs and services for English Language Learners
- Parent Workshops - Schools are required to assist parents in understanding state content standards, assessments being used to monitor their children's progress, and ways parents can help to improve student achievement
- Volunteers - Parents can become a school volunteer



Alternative Supports

Interventions such as After School Education and Safety (ASES), tutoring, after school classes, and summer programs are offered.

Students with the highest need are given priority.
